PROPOSITION A

Adds Charter Section 158.01: Empowers Board of Supervisors by three-fourths vote to enact ordinances relative to retirement and death benefits of City employees.

CHARTER AMENDMENT

Describing and setting forth a proposal to the qualified electors of the City and County of San Francisco to amend the Charter of said city and county by adding Section 158.01 thereto, relating to retirement and death benefits for members of the Retirement System under Sections 165, 165.2, 168.1 and 171.1 of the Charter.

The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco hereby submits to the qualified electors of said city and county at an election to be held therein on June 7, 1966, a proposal to amend the charter of said city and county by adding Section 158.01 thereto, to read as follows:

Section 158.01. The Board of Supervisors is hereby empowered to enact by a vote of three-fourths of its members an ordinance or ordinances providing retirement and death benefits under the retirement system, in addition to the retirement and death benefits provided by this Charter; all of which benefits provided by this Charter are hereby declared to be minimum benefits only; provided that the Board of Supervisors shall secure, through the retirement board, an actuarial report of the cost and effect of any proposed change in the benefits before enacting an ordinance providing for such benefits.

Contributions to the retirement system necessary to provide benefits enacted pursuant to this action, if applicable to members under Section 165.2, 168.1 or 171.1 shall be provided in the manner stated in Section 165.2(H), Section 168.1.10 or Section 171.1.10 respectively; or if applicable to members under Section 165, according to methods prescribed by the Board of Supervisors. Any additional benefits provided by such ordinance and which are applicable to beneficiaries who, on the effective date of such ordinance, are already receiving allowances under the retirement system shall be funded according to methods prescribed by the Board of Supervisors.

ARGUMENT FOR PROPOSITION "A"

A Is the Answer Eliminates Piece-Meal Charter Amendments

Proposition "A" contains rigid safeguards over the Retirement funds. Every safeguard over the funds now in the Charter remains in effect. Full control of the administration of retirement will remain in the hands of the Retirement System.

Proposition "A" proposes that the Board of Supervisors, after comprehensive actuarial studies and full public hearing, may make necessary adjustments in the Retirement benefits only after nine affirmative votes of the eleven member board.

Proposition "A" will eliminate piece-meal Charter amendments and substitute a plan now in effect for Federal, State and local governments,

employing over a million public employees in California.

Proposition "A" is on the ballot because for many years civic organizations, including influential taxpayer groups, have recognized that there are injustices in the City employees' retirement system which should be remedied. This remedy is fair to all.

Proposition "A" is the answer because it is fair and equitable to all, the

taxpayer, the City employee and the City government.

Proposition "A" has received City-wide support from responsible organizations and the San Francisco press in recognition of the fact that the measure is fair and equitable.

ARGUMENT AGAINST PROPOSITION "A"

Vote "No" on "A" — Reject This Second Attempt to Give the Board of Supervisors Power to Increase Pensions

Last November 120,155 voters said NO on Prop. C — the first City Hall effort to give the supervisors more powers to increase employee pensions without a vote of the people. Prop. A is the same discredited proposal with a minor change — nine votes of the supervisors in place of six for these costly pension increases. An employee publication states "... we are confident we can obtain the nine votes when necessary..."

Vote "No" on "A"

Prudent voters will defeat this scheme again because it is a calculated move by organized city employee groups to take away citizen control over pension benefits. There are more than 25,000 active and retired city employees. Elected supervisors will lend a receptive ear to their demands. That is the reason Prop. "A" is on the ballot only six months after the voters overwhelmingly rejected the same principle of giving these powers to the supervisors.

Vote "No" on "A"

Don't give the supervisors a blank check! There is no known cost reported for "A" because there is no way of determining how greatly retirement costs might be increased by the supervisors in the future. Under this

proposal all present charter benefits would be "minimum." "A" is a blank check for increased spending.

Votè "No" on "A"

It is imperative that you make your vote count against the city employee bloc that would deprive you of the right to vote on costly pension questions. Don't vote a blank check!

ARGUMENT AGAINST PROPOSITION "A"

Proposition "A" is a scheme to turn over pension increases to the Board of Supervisors, instead of putting them to a vote of the people.
